Constructing Green

New recycling options embraced by Pray Construction



Constructing green, or building with environmental impact in mind, isn't a new concept, but for many construction projects it has been just that – a concept. Many say building green takes a whole lot of green, (dollars that is) but when Pray Construction and CASCI saw an opportunity to recycle they were ready to handle the task. During the renovation of the CASCI building in Charleston, Pray and CASCI teamed up with Architectural Interior Products to recycle the old ceiling tiles that were removed during this renovation project.

This was the first project of its' kind in West Virginia.

Almost 100,000 square feet of tiles were to come out of the building and the normal

process would have been to truck those to the local landfill where they would become over 70,000 lbs of landfill waste.

Instead of becoming landfill waste, the tiles will be given a second life as new ceiling tiles thanks to the recycling process of Armstrong World Industries. Armstrong has recycled over 40,000,000 square feet of tiles since it introduced this program in 1999. Pray Construction embraced this option as a way to not only help the environment, but to leave less of a footprint on the lands of West Virginia. Less waste going into a West Virginia landfill means a cleaner West Virginia.

Pray continues to be green with the on going donations of leftover material to ReStore, the local Habitat for Humanity's building material resell shop. Not only does it keep leftover building material out of the local landfills, it provides material or revenue for local building projects of Habitat for Humanity.

Pray Construction is continually seeking opportunities to "go green" with new construction and applauds their clients, such as the new HospiceCare Administrative Offices, who seek to incorporate green design elements in their projects.

Pray asks that you do your part in leaving less of a footprint on this wonderful state. Support companies that are taking the steps to be more environmentally conscious.

tion was honored to be selected as the construction manager for this magnificent project.




Chesapeake Energy - Jane Lew Field Office

HospiceCare to break ground in April 2008


